

HASANUDDIN UNIVERSITY KARATE TEAM SHINES AT THE INTERNATIONAL KARATE RECTOR CUP II 2024



Hasanuddin University (Unhas) Karate Team achieved an outstanding success at the International Karate Rector Cup (IKRC) II 2024, at Graha Unesa, Surabaya, from December 26-29, 2024. The prestigious competition, hosted by Universitas Negeri Surabaya (Unesa), attracted participants from seven countries, showcasing the top karate athletes across various categories.

Unhas secured an impressive total of seven medals: four gold, two silver, and one bronze. Additionally, two athletes, Mulki JP Asnawi from the Faculty of Social and Political Sciences (FISIP) and Ananditha Mutia Azzahra, also from FISIP, were awarded the prestigious Best of the Best titles in the Kata Men's and Women's categories, respectively. Their exceptional performances underscored the team's dominance and excellence in the competition.

The presence of Unhas Vice Rector for Academic and Student Affairs, Prof. Drg. Muhammad Ruslin, MKes, PhD, SpBM(K), and the Director of Student Affairs, Dr. Abdullah Sanusi, SE, MBA, PhD, provided significant motivation for the team. Prof. Ruslin expressed immense pride in the team's achievements, emphasizing their importance not only for the karate athletes but also for Hasanuddin University as a whole. He highlighted the university's commitment to fostering student talent, stating, "The Best of the Best awards won by our students are concrete evidence of the excellence of Unhas athletes. We will continue to support their development to achieve even greater success in the future."

The breakdown of Unhas' medal achievements includes gold medals in Men's Team Kata, Women's Team Kata, Men's Individual Kata, and Women's Individual Kata. Silver medals were won in Men's and Women's Individual Kata, while a bronze medal was earned in the -55kg Men's Kumite category. This success is expected to inspire other Unhas students to excel both nationally and internationally. Prof. Ruslin reiterated the university's unwavering support for student development in various fields, ensuring that their potential can flourish to achieve remarkable accomplishments.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENT; FROM TANZANIA TO MAKASSAR: AN INTERNATIONAL STUDENT'S EXPERIENCE

The International Office (IO) had the opportunity to interview him during his semester break, delving into various aspects of his journey. Said shared insights about his path to Makassar, his most memorable cultural experiences, his adaptation to a new lifestyle, advice for future students, and his thoughts on the IO's role and support. Here is the full story of his inspiring journey:

A Journey from Tanzania to Makassar

My name is Said Sadallah. I come from Tanzania, Africa, and I am pursuing a Master's degree in Chemistry at UNHAS, Faculty of Mathematics and Natural Sciences (FMIPA). Said's path to UNHAS began with his visits from the Indonesian Embassy in Tanzania, where he first learned about the university's programs and the prestigious KNB (*Kemitraan Negara Berkembang*) Scholarship or usually called Developing Countries Partnership Scholarship.

"I first heard about Hasanuddin University during a workshop, and later I applied for the KNB Scholarship, which was highly competitive. I was fortunate to be selected, and that opportunity brought me here," he explained.

A Memorable Experience in a New Culture


Said's arrival in Indonesia marked the beginning of a life-changing journey. He shared some of his most surprising and memorable experiences since coming to Makassar. "The cultural pride here is impressive. Indonesians are deeply connected to their language and traditions, which is very different from my country, where English dominates. I've also been amazed at how welcoming and helpful the local students and lecturers are—they go out of their way to support me whenever I face challenges."

He further highlighted how his perspective on education has evolved. "Back home, education focuses heavily on passing tests. Here, I've learned to value critical thinking and self-confidence. These skills have helped me grow as both a student and a person."

Adapting to a New Lifestyle

Adjusting to a new environment always comes with challenges, and for Said, food was an area of cultural adaptation. "In Tanzania, rice is usually cooked with salt and oil, but here, the preparation is different. At first, it was difficult, but I've adjusted by exploring local restaurants and trying to cook on my own. The people here have been very supportive, which made it easier to adapt."

Said also shared his thoughts on engaging with local culture to enhance his experience. "Interacting with people has been key to understanding the language and culture better. I enjoy learning by talking to locals and getting involved in different activities. This has made my time here more fulfilling."

As an international student, Said believes UNHAS provides an excellent opportunity for learning and personal development. "UNHAS offers a welcoming environment, affordable living costs, and a vibrant cultural experience. The local students are supportive, and the lecturers are approachable.
