UNHAS IO AND YCU DISCUSS INTERNATIONALIZATION STRATEGIES AND FUTURE PROGRAMS



The International Office (IO) of Hasanuddin University (UNHAS) participated in a Staff Exchange Program by visiting Yokohama City University (YCU), Japan. The visit took place on February 4, 2025, at YCU's Office of International Affairs. The UNHAS IO team was warmly welcomed by Mr. Yves Gendron, Manager of International Cooperation and Partnership, along with two other YCU staff members.

During the meeting, both parties engaged in a fruitful discussion about the roles and activities of their respective international offices. This exchange provided valuable insights to enhance the programs and collaborations between the two institutions. Additionally, a Zoom meeting was conducted to involve all consortium members led by YCU. The virtual discussion aimed to coordinate the implementation of the International Academic Consortium for Sustainable Cities (IACSC) Conference, that will be hosted by UNHAS this year.

Led by Andi Masyitha Irwan, Ph.D. (Head of UNHAS IO), the UNHAS team—Khaeruddin, Ph.D., and Saaduddin, Ph.D.—presented the draft plan for the IACSC Conference. The draft also integrated the 8th International Cultural Program (ICP) as part of the event, aiming to encourage student participation from all consortium members. The final decision on member participation will be further discussed in a webinar meeting of Consortium Leaders.

The visit to YCU concluded with a photo session and the exchange of tokens of appreciation, marking a strong step forward in the ongoing collaboration between UNHAS and YCU.





FROM ALUMNI TO PARTNERS: UNHAS AND KANAZAWA UNIVERSITY DEEPEN TIES



Following their visit to Yokohama City University (YCU), the International Office (IO) of Hasanuddin University (UNHAS) continued its Staff Exchange Program by visiting Kanazawa University (KU) on February 7, 2025. The delegation was officially welcomed by Dr. Noriko Hasebe (Vice President), accompanied by several KU leaders, including Hideki Yamamoto (Director of the International Students Exchange Division), Mammadova Aida (Advisor to the President on International Affairs), and two faculty members.

During the discussions, a key highlight was that Andi Masyitha Irwan, Ph.D. (Head of UNHAS IO), popularly known as Ms. Citha, and Syahrul, Ph.D. (Vice Dean for Academic and Student Affairs, Faculty of Nursing, UNHAS), are both alumni of Kanazawa University. Another major topic was the 8th International Cultural Program (ICP), where UNHAS expressed its hope for KU students to participate in future editions of the program. Additionally, UNHAS IO shared its best practices in Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), particularly Life Below Water, where UNHAS ranked second in Indonesia in both 2022 and 2023. This achievement drew special interest from Ms. Aida, who oversees SDGs initiatives at KU.

Before concluding the visit, Ms. Citha presented the UNHAS IO Newsletter, which featured a recent Kanazawa faculty member's visit to UNHAS' Faculty of Engineering. She emphasized that all UNHAS international guests are highlighted in the IO Weekly News and later compiled into the Monthly Newsletter.

The visit ended with a photo session and a token exchange. As the UNHAS delegation departed, they took time to enjoy a tour around the snow-covered Kanazawa University campus, experiencing the aftermath of a heavy snowstorm that had hit the city just a day before their arrival.



STRENGTHENING INTERNATIONAL COLLABORATION: UITM PPDS STUDENTS BEGIN ONE-MONTH PROGRAM AT UNHAS

The three PPDS students from UiTM are Dr. Muhammad Mus'ab Bin Ilyasak, Dr. Najihah Binti Abdul Rahman, and Dr. Nadhirah Binti Haniffah. Prof. Rina extended a warm welcome to the students, expressing her hopes that they would gain valuable experience and learn from the diverse medical cases encountered during their stay in Makassar.

This inbound program is a continuation of the academic collaboration between the two Rehabilitation Medicine programs, strengthening educational and research partnerships. The arrival of specialist-level students from UiTM also underscores UNHAS's growing international reputation as a destination for advanced medical training.

The UiTM PPDS students will undertake a one-month study program in Makassar, where they are expected to acquire not only high-quality medical knowledge but also gain a broader understanding of Indonesian culture.



UNHAS TO SHOWCASE ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE AT ASEAN UNIVERSITY FORUM 2025

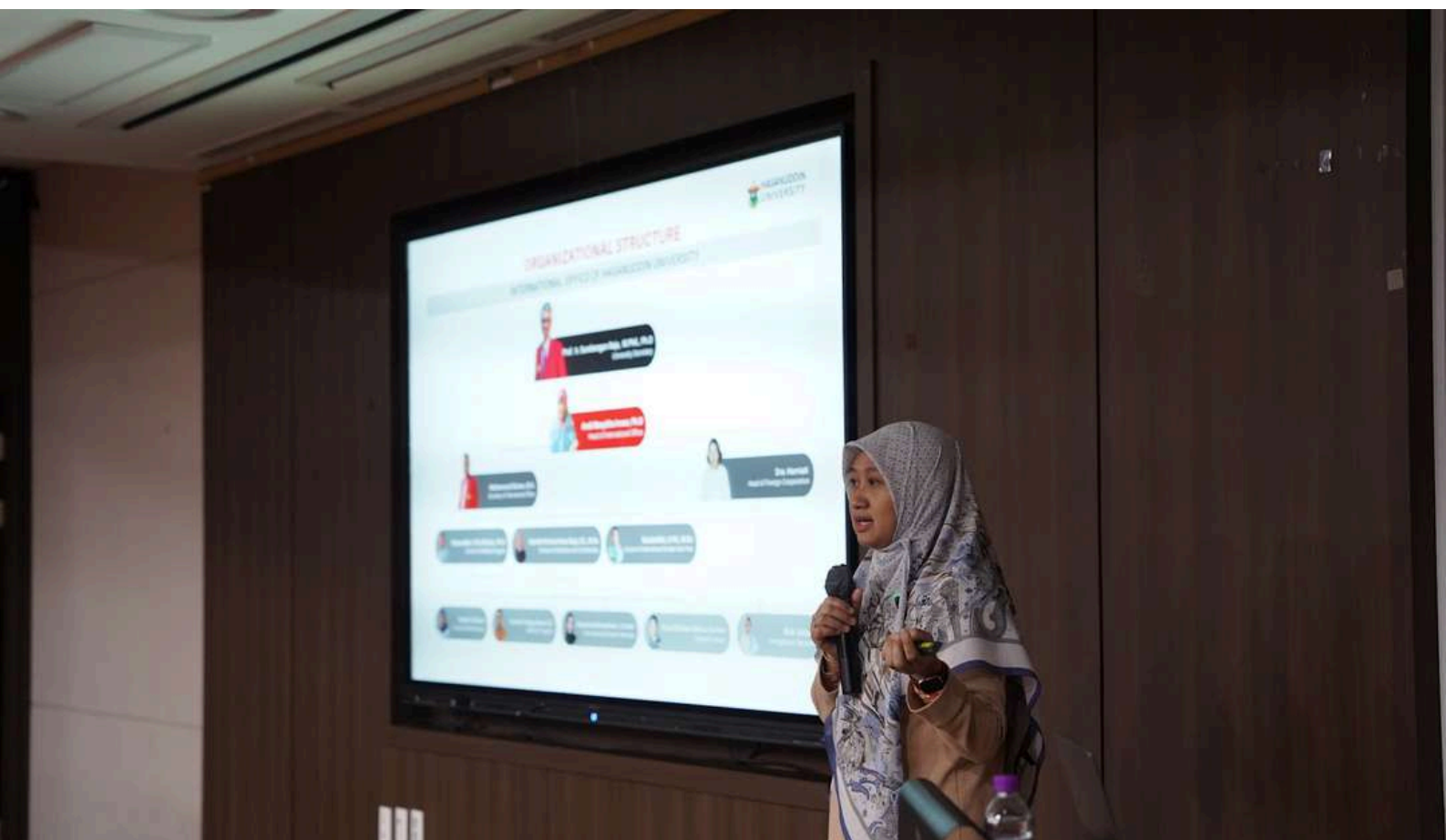

He emphasized that this event presents a valuable opportunity for Indonesian universities to attract prospective students from various countries.

To facilitate smooth participation, the Indonesian Embassy will issue official invitation letters to all participating Indonesian universities. This letter will serve as a supporting document for customs clearance at Kuala Lumpur International Airport, ensuring that universities can transport their exhibition materials without any issues.

The meeting concluded with an invitation for participants to join a follow-up discussion with the AEF organizing committee and other ASEAN universities involved in the event.

As part of its Staff Exchange Program, the International Office (IO) of Hasanuddin University (UNHAS) visited Incheon National University (INU), South Korea, on February 12, 2025, from 9:00 to 11:00 AM Incheon time. Following the session, the UNHAS delegation had the opportunity to explore the INU campus, particularly its state-of-the-art library. Equipped with modern technology and a special entrance card system, the library operates 24/7, which greatly impressed the UNHAS team. Making this visit an eye-opening experience in terms of accessibility and student support facilities.

The visit concluded with a courtesy gesture from INU, which provided transportation for the UNHAS team. This act of hospitality left a lasting impression, reinforcing the strong academic partnership between the two institutions. The event's success inspired the UNHAS team to consider implementing a similar initiative in Makassar. Although UNHAS may not replicate the pizza idea, they are considering offering a traditional sweet from Makassar as a way to bring together international students and faculty in a fun, engaging manner.

During the visit, the UNHAS delegation had the opportunity to present the 7th International Cultural Program (ICP) video, highlighting the exchange of cultures and experiences. Andi Masyitha Irwan, Ph.D., (Head of UNHAS IO), expressed her gratitude to KU for hosting the team and emphasized that for the 8th ICP, UNHAS hopes to welcome KU students to participate. This would mark the first time Korean students would take part in the program, and UNHAS extended an invitation for KU students to join a 10-day excursion to Makassar, South Sulawesi, Indonesia. The aim is to enrich the cultural diversity and exchange between the institutions.

The visit concluded with a photo session and the exchange of tokens, symbolizing the growing partnership between UNHAS and KU. This moment marked another step toward strengthening the collaboration between the two universities, fostering closer ties for future academic and cultural exchanges.

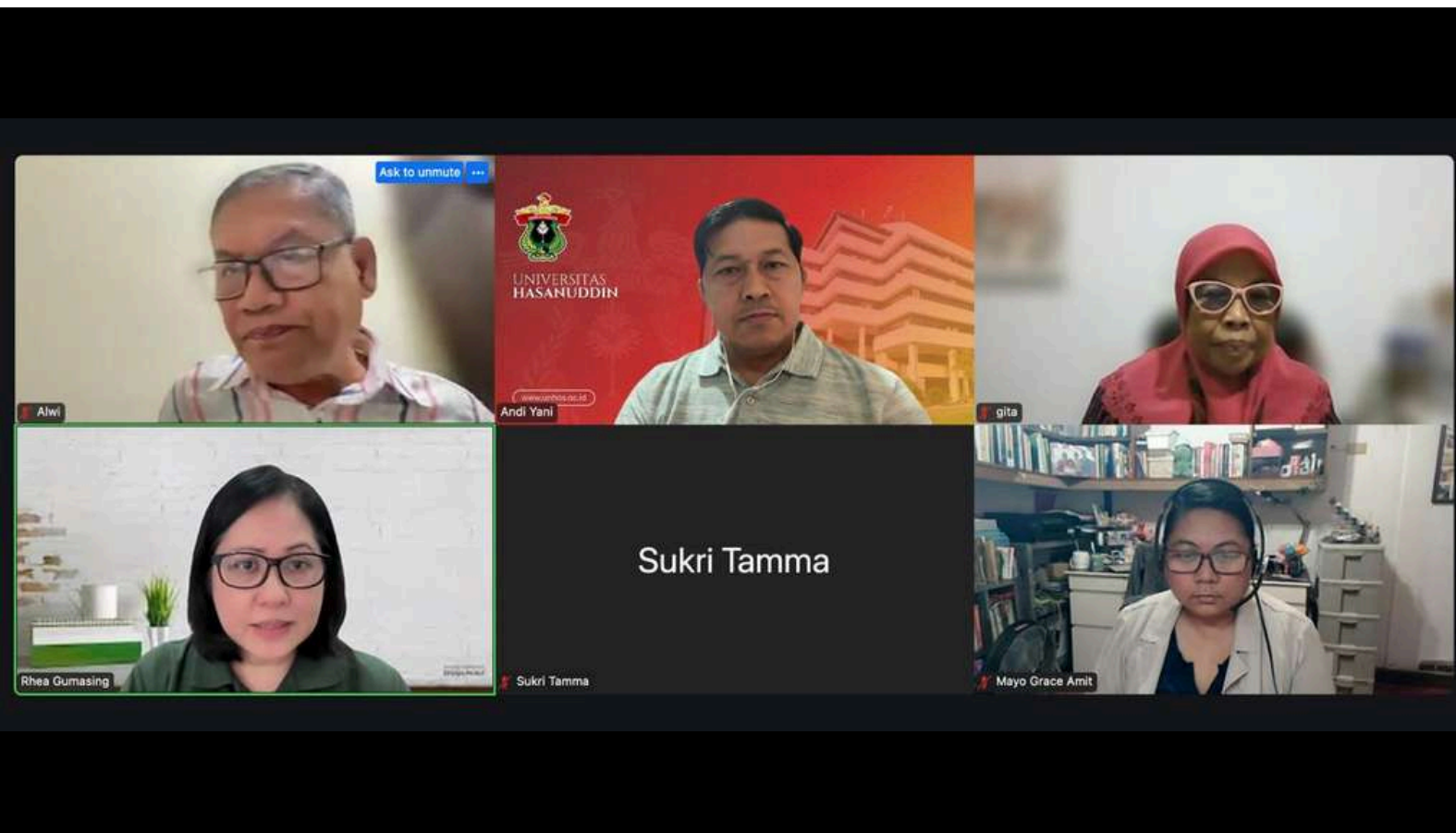

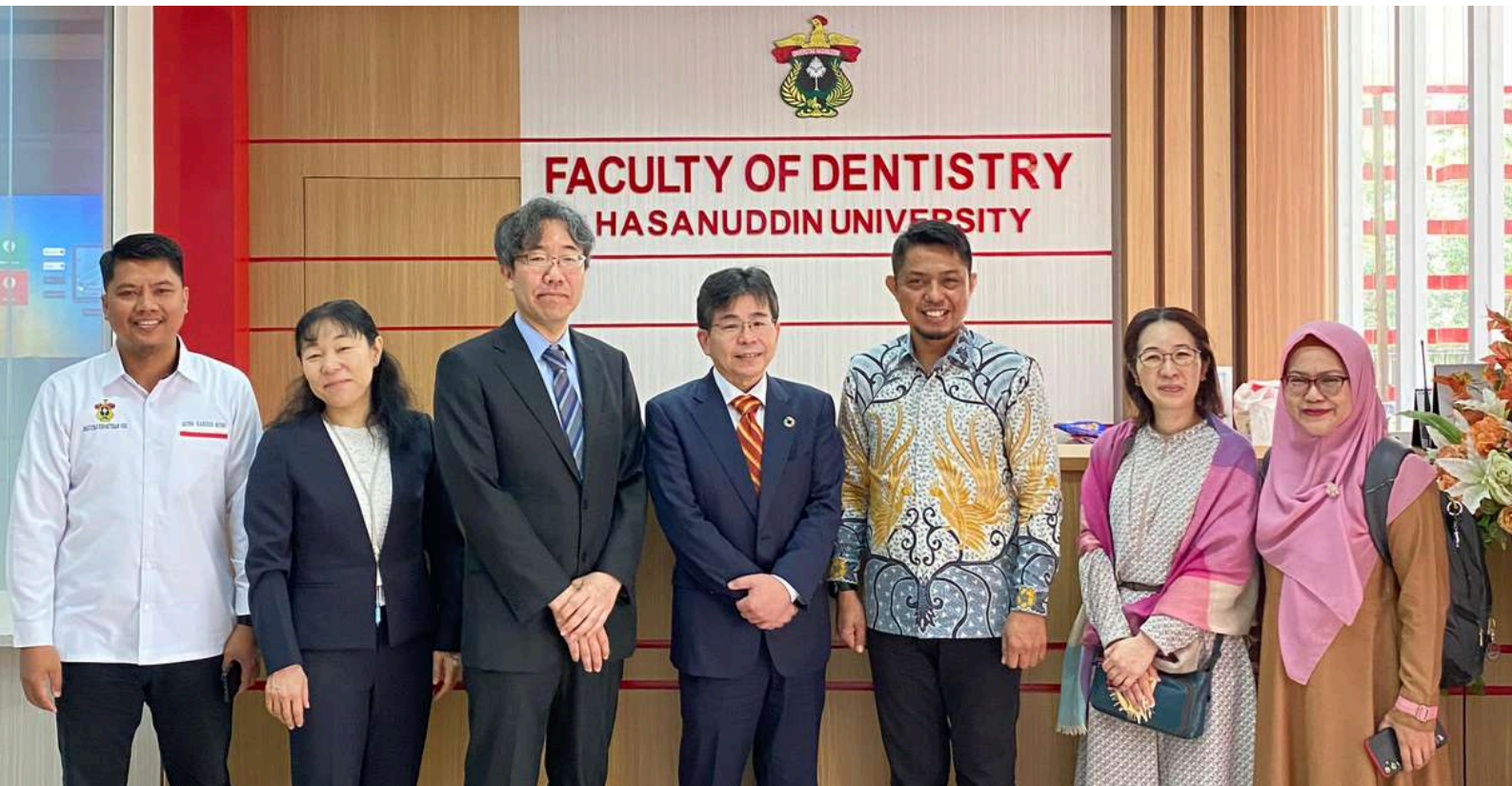

On February 17-18, 2025, a team from the Faculty of Health Sciences, Okayama University, visited the Faculty of Nursing (FKep), Hasanuddin University (UNHAS) to explore possible academic and research partnerships. The group, led by Professor Satoshi Hirohata, included Professor Yoko Aihara (Nursing Department), Professor Toshihiro Iguchi (Radiology Technology Department), and Ms. Kaori Yajima (Coordinator of the Global Network Project to Promote Study in Japan).

The visit started with a warm reception from Professor Ariyanti Saleh, Dean of FKep at UNHAS, in the Senate Room. Discussions covered opportunities for student and faculty exchanges, collaborative research with the TRG (Thematic Research Group), and co-authored publications. As part of the agenda, Professor Yoko Aihara, a specialist in Community Health Nursing, gave a lecture on *Community Health Nursing in Japan & How Health Literacy Influences Chronic Disease Management* to undergraduate and master's students focusing on Community Nursing. The session was held at the UNHAS Institute for Research and Community Services (LPPM) Building.

On the second day, Professor Aihara visited the Antara Public Health Center (Puskesmas Antara). She met with staff members to discuss digital literacy in healthcare and observed Posyandu (community health post) programs, which included services for infants, young children, and older adults facilitated by volunteers and local residents.

Dr. Takdir Tahir, Vice Dean for Partnership, Research, and Innovation, expressed appreciation for the collaboration, noting that the FKep was chosen as a partner by Okayama University, ranked among Japan's top 20 universities. He highlighted that this initiative would contribute to nursing education and research through international engagement, reinforcing connections between the institutions and creating shared academic and scientific benefits.

The session, moderated by Haniek Khoirunnissa, M.Sc from the IO Task Force, sparked great interest, leading to a lively Q&A session. Even after the official closing at 11:00 AM, participants remained engaged in discussions with the speakers. EMPOWERING FUTURE LEADERS: IO UNHAS CONDUCTS STUDENT VOLUNTEER TRAINING

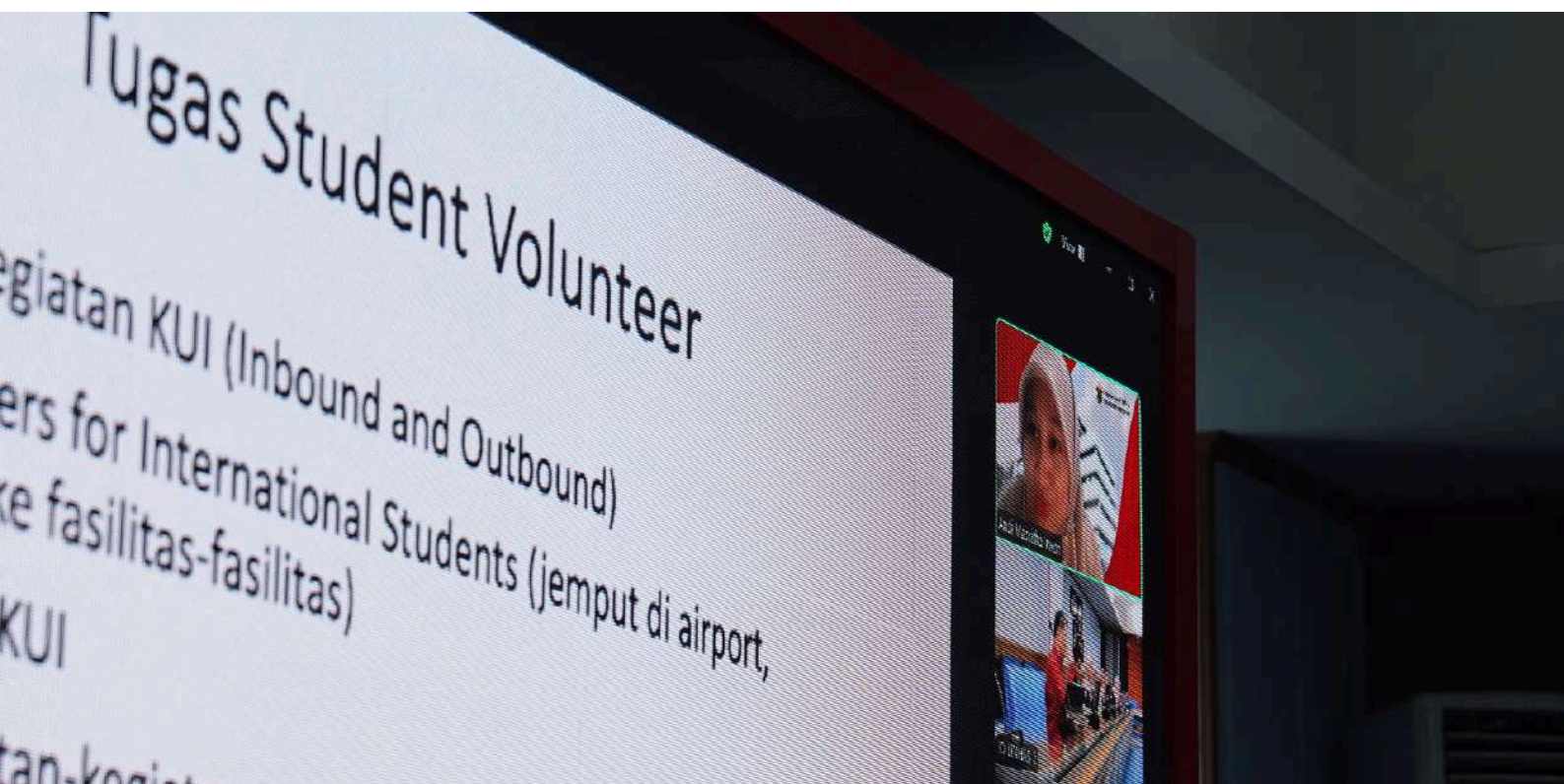

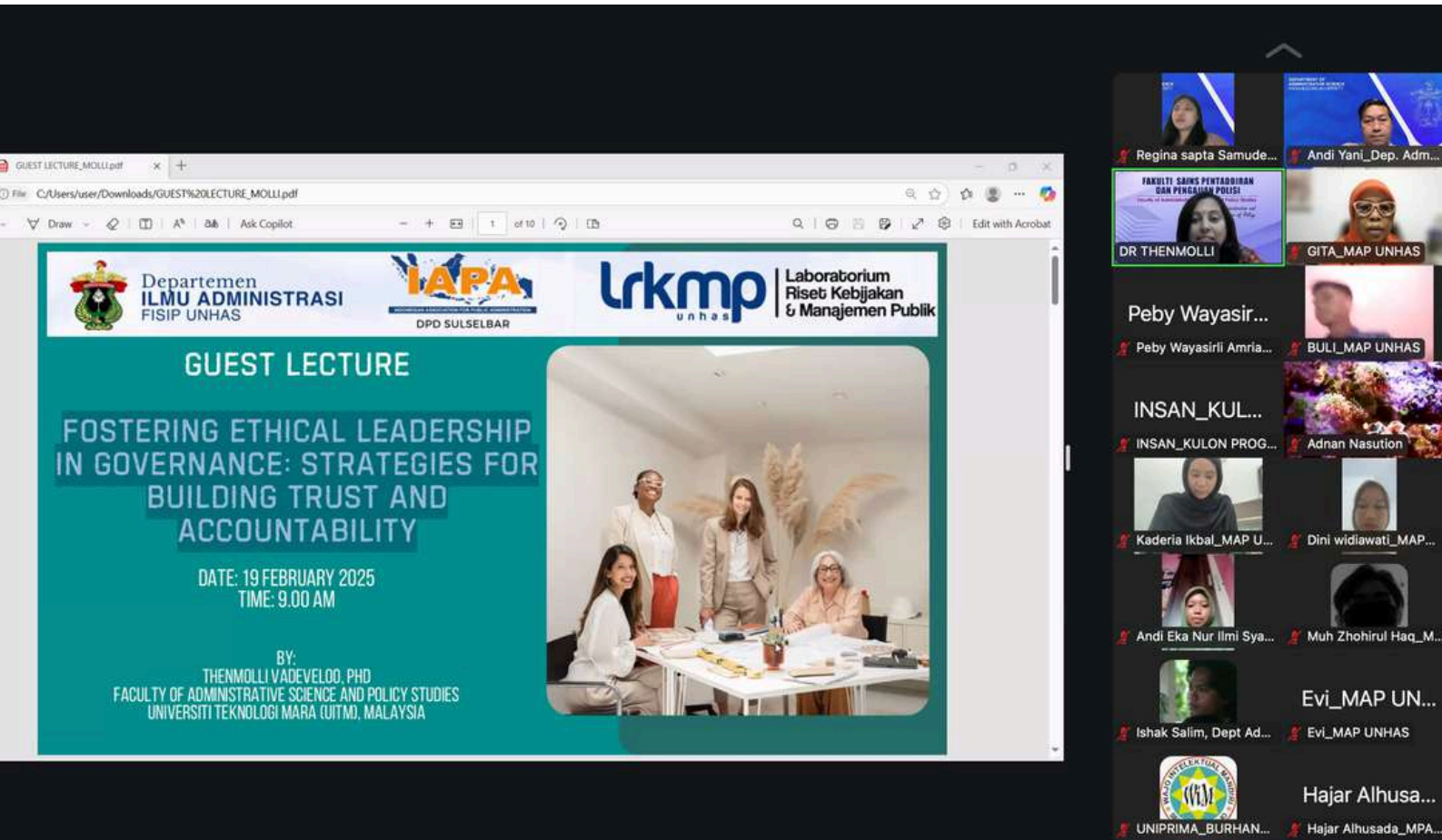

By establishing a structured double degree and exchange program with Saxion University, UNHAS aims to enhance international exposure for its students and strengthen its position in global education networks.

During the presentation, the French students showcased various aspects of their country, including its world-famous landmarks, fashion industry, vibrant culture, and the unique characteristics of its people. They shared insights into France's rich heritage, offering an engaging and interactive experience for attendees. The event attracted around 100 students from different faculties across UNHAS, fostering cross-cultural dialogue and appreciation.

The success of this G-Series was made possible through the active involvement of IO Student Volunteers, who played a key role in organizing and facilitating the event. IO expressed its gratitude to the presenters and the UNHAS students who participated, emphasizing the importance of such initiatives in strengthening international engagement and cultural exchange within the university.



PROMOTING BALANCED NUTRITION IN SCHOOLS: A COLLABORATIVE EFFORT BETWEEN FKM UNHAS AND TOYO FOOD JAPAN



The Nutrition Science Study Program, Faculty of Public Health (FKM), Hasanuddin University (UNHAS), held a meeting to discuss the trial of a nutritious school lunch menu as part of its collaboration with Toyo Food Japan on Wednesday, 5 February 2025. The event took place in the Prof. Nur Nasry Noor Room, 2nd Floor of FKM Unhas, starting at 09:00 WITA until completion.

The meeting was attended by representatives from Toyo Food Japan, including Yurika Mori, a nutrition expert, Yutaka Oki, Assistant General Manager, and Managing Director Hidetoshi Ogikubo. Several academics from FKM Unhas were also present, including Prof. Dr. Veni Hadju, MSc, Ph.D., as well as faculty members from the Nutrition Science and Public Health study programs.

During the event, representatives from Toyo Food Japan introduced the concept of nutritious school lunches based on Japan's experience and system. In their presentation, they explained that school lunches in Japan are not merely about fulfilling students' nutritional needs but also serve as an educational tool. The school lunch system in Japan is designed to teach children about nutritional values, food processing, and healthy eating habits. Children are encouraged not to waste food, and teachers eat together with students to set an example. Ingredients are sourced locally whenever possible. To ensure sufficient calcium intake, students are required to drink milk, and the used milk cartons are washed and recycled. Additionally, after eating, students habitually brush their teeth together and collectively clean the dining area.

It was also mentioned that in Japan, school lunches cost around 300 yen (approximately IDR 30,000) per meal, partially covered by parents and subsidized by local governments. The speaker emphasized that school lunches are a crucial pillar of Japan's national health policy.

Dr. Healthy Hidayanty, SKM, M.Kes, stated that as part of the trial, FKM Unhas is also conducting a survey on children's eating habits and nutritional status. This program is designed to align with students' nutritional needs, as school lunches contribute approximately 20 to 30 percent of their daily nutritional requirements. Furthermore, a trial of a healthy menu for both parents and children will be conducted as a form of direct education. Through this collaboration, it is hoped that the concept of nutritious school lunches can be widely implemented in Indonesian schools, ensuring children receive a balanced diet to support their optimal growth and development.

The Nutrition Science Study Program at FKM Unhas will test two menu variations. One of the trial menu consists of 150 grams of white rice, 31 grams of soy sauce tofu, 78 grams of stir-fried green beans and carrots, 92 grams of sweet and sour chicken, 89 grams of pickles, 34 grams of tomato sambal, and 30 grams of banana. This menu includes 150 grams of staple food, 123 grams of protein sources from both animal and plant-based ingredients, 167 grams of vegetables, and 30 grams of fruit, providing a total of 689 kilocalories of energy, 16 grams of protein, 31 grams of fat, and 86 grams of carbohydrates.

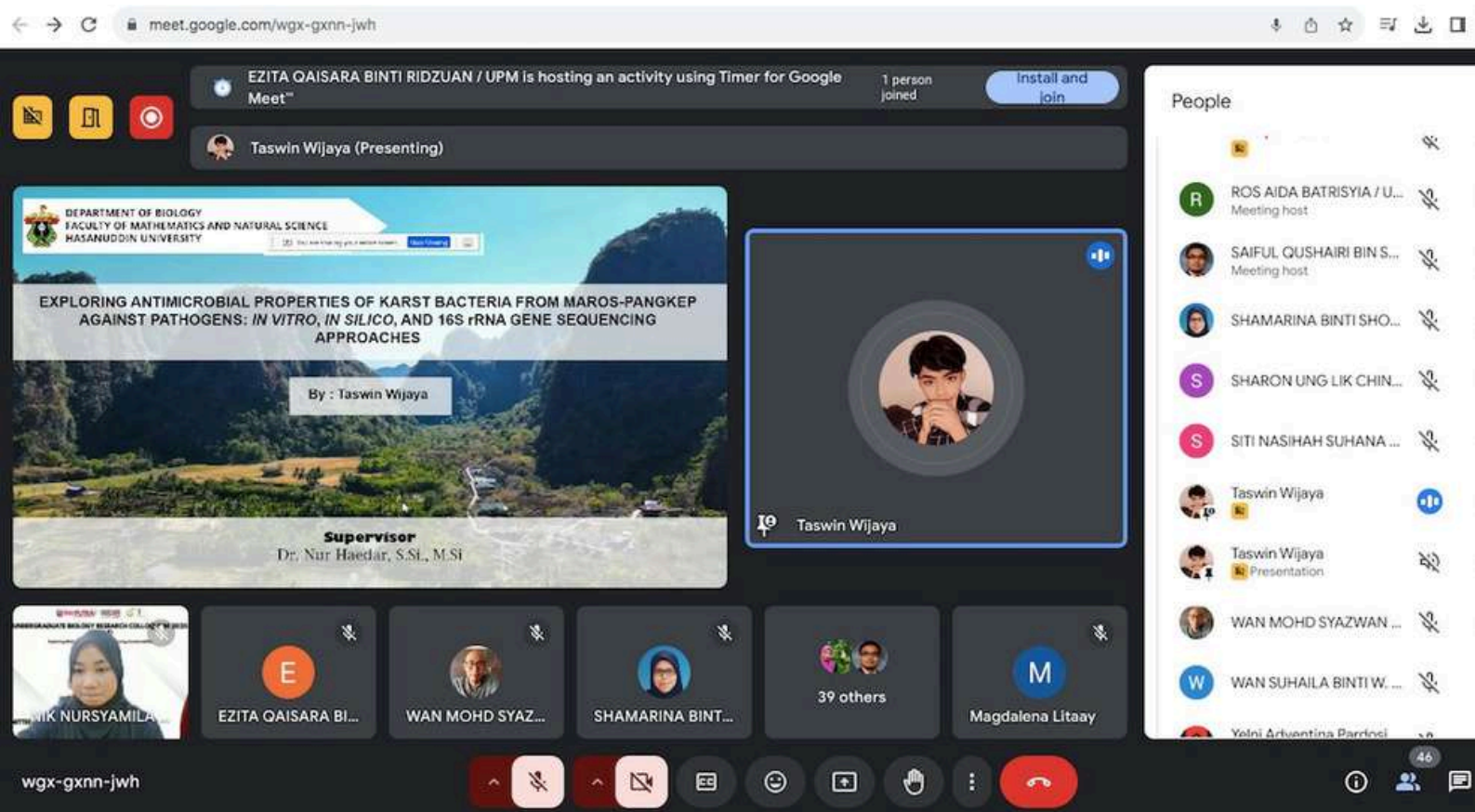
The collaboration between the Nutrition Science Study Program at FKM Unhas and Toyo Food Japan in the trial of a nutritious school lunch menu aligns with several Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), particularly SDG 2 on Zero Hunger, SDG 3 on Good Health and Well-being, and SDG 4 on Quality Education. This program aims to enhance the nutritional quality of school children's meals, prevent malnutrition, and support their optimal growth and development, directly contributing to food security and health improvements. Moreover, by providing healthy meals in schools, this initiative can boost students' concentration and academic performance, supporting the achievement of quality education.

From an innovation and global collaboration perspective, the involvement of the Japanese food industry in this program supports SDG 9 on Industry, Innovation, and Infrastructure through technology transfer and the development of nutrition-based food innovations. Additionally, this initiative has the potential to inspire local food industries to adopt higher nutritional standards, aligning with SDG 17 on Partnerships for the Goals, which emphasizes the importance of global partnerships in achieving sustainable development.





UNHAS BIOLOGY STUDENTS ENGAGE IN UBRC 2025 TO FOSTER GLOBAL SCIENTIFIC COLLABORATION

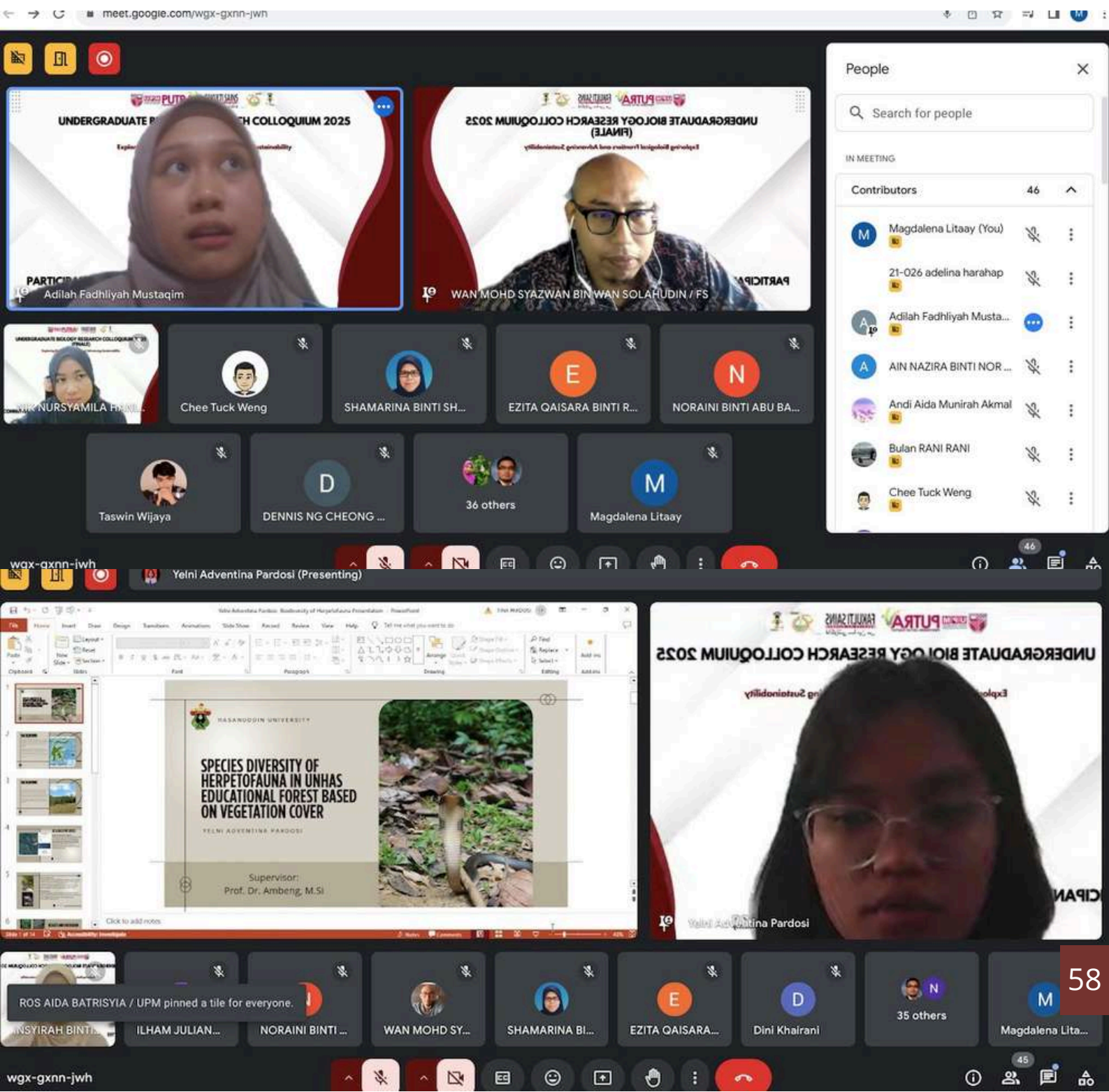
