## GERMAN STUDENTS EMBARK ON CULTURAL AND ACADEMIC JOURNEY AT UNHAS



The International Office (IO) of Hasanuddin University (UNHAS) warmly welcomed two inbound students from the Universität der Bundeswehr München, Germany, on Monday, 6 January 2025. The students, Lieutenant Riccardo Sawaschinski and Lieutenant Max Werner, were accompanied by Dr. Birkah Latif and Dr. Kadaruddin from the Faculty of Law (FH). Muhammad Ridwan, M.A., the IO Secretary, led the welcoming ceremony, joined by Saaduddin, M.Sc., the IO Task Force and other IO staff.

During the visit, Mr. Ridwan provided an overview of the IO's signature programs, designed to enhance international students' cultural and academic experiences at UNHAS. He highlighted the Geography Series (G-Series), where international students showcase their countries to both local and international academic communities. He also elaborated on the International Student Festival (ISF) and the International Cultural Program (ICP), among other initiatives that foster intercultural exchange and global understanding.

The students also enjoyed a tour of the IO facilities, where Mr. Ridwan shared insights about the many photos and displays that document the IO's vibrant history and activities. The engaging walkthrough offered the students a glimpse into the dynamic role of the IO in promoting internationalization at UNHAS.

The visit concluded with a group photo session and the presentation of UNHAS-themed merchandise to both students. ## STRENGTHENING TIES: UNHAS STUDENTS AND LECTURERS EXPLORE ACADEMIC AND CULTURAL EXCHANGE AT OKAYAMA UNIVERSITY



Students and lecturers from the Faculty of Dentistry (FKG) and Faculty of Public Health (FKM) at Universitas Hasanuddin (UNHAS) participated in a student exchange program with Okayama University on December 18, 2024. This visit marked the continuation of the ongoing collaboration between Okayama University's Faculty of Health Sciences and UNHAS's Faculties of Dentistry, Public Health, Nursing, and Medicine.

The program aimed to enhance relationships between the two universities by exploring their education systems and the advanced technologies applied in learning, particularly in dentistry. During the visit, participants toured various facilities, including laboratories dedicated to oral surgery, orthodontics, and prosthodontics, showcasing cutting-edge technology that supports both research and clinical practice.

In addition to academic activities, the program introduced UNHAS participants to the social and cultural aspects of life at Okayama University. As part of this experience, they visited Korakuen Garden, one of Japan's most renowned traditional gardens. Here, they learned about the harmony-focused philosophy of Japanese garden design and its cultural significance.

This exchange program highlights the importance of fostering collaboration beyond academics, incorporating cultural and social elements to create a well-rounded partnership. It is hoped that this initiative will further strengthen ties between the universities, benefiting both parties in areas of academic excellence, research innovation, and cultural exchange. Such experiences provide a valuable platform to expand perspectives and elevate the quality of education in the future.





## PREPARING UNHAS NURSING STUDENTS FOR THE SAKURA SCIENCE PROGRAM: INSIGHTS FROM PREDEPARTURE TRAINING



The International Office (IO) of Hasanuddin University (UNHAS) facilitated two insightful sessions at the Pre-Departure Training (PDT) for nursing students participating in the Sakura Science Program (SSP). Held by the Faculty of Nursing (FKep) on Friday, January 10, 2024, the PDT was officially opened by Prof. drg. Muhammad Ruslin, Ph.D., (Vice Rector for Academic and Student Affairs), accompanied by Syahrul, Ph.D., (Vice Dean for Academic and Student Affairs), and other officials from the Rectorate and Dean's office. The training supports the preparation of seven selected students—six from the Nursing and Physiotherapy undergraduate programs and one from the Nursing master's program—who will spend a week at Yokohama City University (YCU), Japan. Due to illness, one student was unable to attend the PDT.

The two sessions delivered by the IO aimed to equip students with essential knowledge for their outbound experience. Andi Masyitha Irwan, Ph.D., (Head of the IO), presented "Outbound Students and Teachers as UNHAS Ambassadors," emphasizing the role of students as cultural representatives of the university. Muhammad Ridwan, M.A.,(IO Secretary) conducted a session titled "Cross-Cultural Understanding: Going Abroad, What Should I Do?" where he discussed strategies for adapting to new cultures, maintaining respect, and making the most of their academic journey abroad. These sessions ensured that students are well-prepared not only academically but also culturally for their visit to YCU.

The Sakura Science Program offers students an opportunity to engage in academic activities, including classroom discussions and presentations, at YCU. The IO's involvement in such training highlights its commitment to supporting outbound students at both university and faculty levels. By providing comprehensive pre-departure guidance, the IO ensures that students uphold UNHAS's values and maintain exemplary behavior as ambassadors during their international journey.





#### SAKURA SCIENCE PLAN EXCHANGE PROGRAM 2025, ATTENDED BY STUDENTS OF THE FACULTY OF NURSING, HASANUDDIN UNIVERSITY, SUCCESSFULLY COMPLETED



Another milestone was achieved by the delegation of the Faculty of Nursing (FKep), Hasanuddin University (UNHAS), by successfully completing the Sakura Science Plan Exchange Program 2025 at Yokohama City University (YCU), Japan, from 13 to 19 January 2025. The program is one of several collaborations between the FKep, UNHAS, and the Department of Nursing, YCU This was the second time it has been held offline.

There were 7 students selected through internal selection, consisting of 1 Master of Nursing student, 1 Professional Nurse student, 3 Bachelor of Science in Nursing students, and 2 Bachelor of Physiotherapy students. They were accompanied by a physiotherapy lecturer. The theme of the program this year was "Mental Health Support for Disaster Areas using Information and Communication Technology (ICT)", allowing the sharing of knowledge and experience in disaster relief between Indonesia and Japan.

The program was officially opened by the Dean Prof. Tomoko Akase and other faculty members on 14 January 2025 at the Department of Nursing building, Fuukura Campus, YCU. Following that, several faculty members who accompanied the delegation throughout the program were introduced: Prof. Noriko Yamada, Prof. Nao Tamai, Asst. Prof. Yayoi Shoji, Asst. Prof. Tomoya Kato, Yuriko Tanabe, Nozomi Fujisawa, Eriko Hayashi, Misuzu Sato, and Emi Shimomura.

The program continued with lectures from Asst. Prof. Yayoi Shoji and Prof. Noriko Yamada. The session on that day concluded with lectures, attended by both UNHAS and YCU students, given by 2 keynote speakers: Lena Akai, Ph.D., a psychologist and health coach; and the Dean of the FKep, UNHAS, Prof. Dr. Ariyanti Saleh, S.Kp., M.Si. Both spoke about the role of healthcare professionals in disaster situations, focusing on mental health issues in Japan and Indonesia, respectively.

The delegates, accompanied by YCU lecturers, had the opportunity to visit YCU Medical Centre on 15 January 2025, particularly the Emergency Intensive Care Unit and Disaster Medical Assistance Team room. After that, they went to Minami Ward and Naka District for a field survey to experience disaster preparedness and management in Yokohama. The next day included group work between UNHAS students and YCU students. After a class break, they continued to present their group work on several topics covering the situation in both countries, such as types of disasters, disaster preparedness, disaster management, healthcare professional teams in disaster relief, and mental health problems due to disasters. The session concluded with a farewell party. YCU students held a mini quiz about Japan and Indonesia and an origami-making simulation. UNHAS delegates performed the Mappadendang Dance, a traditional dance from South Sulawesi.

A visit to the Honjo Life Safety Learning Center was conducted on the last day. The delegates were accompanied by YCU lecturers and one student volunteer. They experienced disaster preparedness through four simulations: small-scale firefighting, basic life support, life protection during an earthquake, and evacuation of a smoke-filled room. That program was followed by an excursion to Asakusa, Tokyo, Japan.

The exchange of experiences in dealing with mental health disorders in disaster areas in both countries was essential and meaningful for learning from each other. Students from both UNHAS and YCU performed excellently in this program. Noriko Yamada expressed his gratitude and satisfaction with the performances of the students from both universities and looks forward to the next visit of a delegation from UNHAS to Japan, especially to YCU.







### UNHAS OFFICIALLY LAUNCHES INTERNATIONAL COMMUNITY SERVICE PROGRAM TO MALAYSIA



Hasanuddin University (UNHAS) officially sent off its International Community Service Program (KKN) participants in collaboration with the Indonesian Embassy (KBRI) in Malaysia on Thursday, January 9, 2025. The send-off ceremony, held at the Rectorate Lounge, was led by Prof. drg. Muhammad Ruslin, M.Kes., Ph.D., Sp.BM(K) (Vice Rector for Academic and Student Affairs), who emphasized the importance of creating community-based programs and teamwork among the 28 student participants. He encouraged the students to apply their academic knowledge in providing practical solutions and highlighted the potential of Kuliah Kerja Nyata (KKN) or Community-Based Education to generate policy briefs on immigrant issues.

The KKN program, coordinated by the Education Attaché at KBRI Malaysia, will run for 29 days starting January 11, 2025. During the program, students will teach Indonesian migrant workers' children at several Sekolah Indonesia Kuala Lumpur (SIKL) or Indonesian Schools of Kuala Lumpur. Dr. Ari, Director of Education Transformation and Learning Innovation, and Dr. Syarifuddin Mabe Parenreng, Head of the Sub-Directorate of KKN, also emphasized the significance of expanding international KKN programs, citing the success of a similar initiative in Japan in 2024. The program offers students an opportunity to contribute to education while enhancing UNHAS's international reputation. Aula Zuhda Asy-Syaefi, a student from the International Relations study program, expressed excitement and hope for the program, reflecting UNHAS's commitment to community service and international collaboration.



## 2025 BEGINS WITH STRENGTHENED TIES: UNHAS AND SOUTH KOREA'S HISTORICAL RESEARCH CONSORTIUM



On January 8, 2025, the Department of History at Hasanuddin University (UNHAS) hosted a seminar on "The History of Things in Eurasia." This seminar is part of a consortium research project involving multiple South Korean universities. The project, spanning Asia and Europe, represents a long-term, interdisciplinary exploration of cultural and historical dynamics, and UNHAS is proud to play an active role in this significant collaboration.

Earlier, in late 2024, a representative from UNHAS was invited to a seminar hosted by the HK+ Plus Team of Dongguk University in Seoul. This seminar, themed "Looking Through Civilization and Cultural History in Terms of Colors," offered a fascinating glimpse into the cultural interpretations of colors across societies. During this event, a paper titled "Changing Colors in South Sulawesi: From Ritual to Class and Political Markers" was presented, examining how the Bugis, Makassar, and Toraja peoples of South Sulawesi have historically used colors in rituals, as markers of social class, and as tools for political expression, especially during post-colonial times.

At the seminar held at the Faculty of Cultural Sciences (FIB) UNHAS, distinguished academics from South Korea, including Prof. In-Beom SEO, Ph.D. (Team Leader, Dongguk University), Prof. Hyung-Jun KIM, Ph.D. (Kangwon National University), and Prof. Jongkuk NAM, Ph.D. (Ewha Womans University), delivered insightful contributions. Prof. SEO, as the project coordinator, praised UNHAS as a strategic partner in their research and expressed optimism about expanding this collaboration. The event attracted attendees from various faculties at UNHAS, including staff and students from the Departments of History and Law, as well as members of the internationalization task force team at FIB.

A major topic of discussion was Indonesia's historical connection to global trade through the spice trade. Two UNHAS historians, Dr. Muslimin AR Effendy and Dr. Ida Liana Tanjung, served as keynote speakers. Dr. Muslimin presented a broader perspective on spices, emphasizing the intersections of colonialism, cultural exchanges, and the strategic role of rivers as trade routes. Meanwhile, Dr. Ida shed light on Makassar's enduring importance as a port city during the Age of Commerce, highlighting its pivotal role in the regional and global spice trade.

The seminar was followed by a field visit to historical spice trade sites in North Maluku, including Ternate, where the Korean research team sought to document collective memories and historical narratives of the spice trade's influence on the region. This journey reinforced the shared historical significance of the spice trade in connecting Indonesia with the world.



To solidify this partnership, an Implementation Arrangement (IA) was signed between UNHAS and its South Korean counterparts. The IA outlines collaborative research projects, academic material and personnel exchanges, and joint academic events such as seminars and workshops. Additionally, the South Korean institutions expressed their willingness to support the establishment of a Korean Studies Program at UNHAS, which could further strengthen cultural and academic ties.

This seminar and the subsequent agreements mark a promising start to 2025 for UNHAS, underscoring its growing role in global academic collaborations and its commitment to enriching historical research and cultural exchange.





### FORGING CONNECTIONS: U.S. CONSULATE AND AMERICAN CORNER VISIT HASANUDDIN UNIVERSITY



The International Office (IO) of Hasanuddin University (UNHAS), represented by Muhammad Ridwan, M.A. (IO Secretary), and Saaduddin (IO Task Force for Immigration and International Students Affairs), recently welcomed Ryzkian Ariandi Pratama from the U.S. Consulate General Office of Surabaya and Abdul Hakim, M.A., Director of American Corner Makassar. The visit focused on updates regarding the official launch of the transformed American Corner, scheduled for January 21–22, 2025, at Nipah Mall, Makassar, marking a shift to a public-focused format aimed at reaching a wider audience, including students, lecturers, and the general public interested in U.S.-related resources.

In addition to discussing the American Corner's transformation, the visit also emphasized plans for a meeting between a representative of the U.S. Consulate and Prof. Jamaluddin Jompa, Ph.D., (Rector) to explore opportunities for collaboration and enhance scientific and academic engagement. The visit concluded with a photo session, highlighting the positive and productive relationship between the International Office and the U.S. representatives, with both parties expressing optimism about future collaborations and the expanded impact of the American Corner in Makassar.



### UNLOCKING GLOBAL OPPORTUNITIES: INFO SESSION ON STUDY ABROAD AND SCHOLARSHIPS



The International Office (IO) of Hasanuddin University (UNHAS) hosted an Info Session on Study Overseas and Scholarship Opportunities on Friday, January 17, 2025, starting at 9:30 AM Makassar time. Organized in collaboration with the International Development Program (IDP) Makassar Branch Office, the session featured a representative from the University of Warwick (UW), United Kingdom. The event was moderated by Saaduddin, Ph.D., (IO Task Force for Immigration and International Student Affairs), and officially opened by Khairuddin, Ph.D., (IO Task Force for Students Mobility), who represented the Head of IO. In his opening remarks, Mr. Khaeruddin emphasized the IO's role in promoting international mobility programs and highlighted its various initiatives, including the International Cultural Program (ICP), Geography Series (GS), and the International Students Festival.

Ms. Andi Fitryana representing IDP Makassar, introduced IDP's services in assisting students planning to study in the UK or Australia. Her presentation provided comprehensive guidance on navigating admissions processes and choosing the right programs. Following this, Mr. Imran Hashim, the representative from the University of Warwick delivered an engaging presentation on admission requirements and scholarship opportunities. Using clear and accessible English, he captivated the audience, sparking interest and prompting numerous questions during the interactive Q&A session.

In her closing remarks, Andi Masyitha Irwan, Ph.D., the Head of IO, expressed her gratitude to IDP and UW representatives for sharing valuable insights. She also appreciated the active participation of attendees and encouraged them to join future IO programs. The session concluded with a photo opportunity and the presentation of a token of appreciation to the University of Warwick representative.

By organizing this info session, the IO reaffirmed its commitment to providing the UNHAS academic community with opportunities to explore global education and scholarship options. Events like these not only strengthen international partnerships but also inspire students to pursue their dreams of studying abroad.


Participants in ODAPUS engaged in a dynamic mix of activities. They attended lectures and seminars that explore the latest innovations in dentistry, research methodologies, and clinical case studies. Clinical practice forms a cornerstone of the program, allowing students to work hands-on at the Okayama University Dental Hospital under the mentorship of world-class experts. Complementing these academic pursuits, interactive workshops provide insights into modern dental tools and technologies, equipping students with cutting-edge skills. Beyond the academic realm, participants immerse themselves in Japan's vibrant culture through visits to historical landmarks, participation in cultural events, and interactions with local students, offering a well-rounded and transformative experience.

The benefits of ODAPUS extended far beyond the classroom. By participating, students could improve their academic and clinical skills while building global professional networks with dental experts and peers. They also gained a broader understanding of international dental education standards, preparing them for the global stage. The cultural exchange aspect enriched their personal and professional lives, allowing them to experience Japan's rich heritage firsthand. ODAPUS is more than just a study program; it is an opportunity for growth, exploration, and building lasting connections in the field of dentistry.





## MAXIMIZING RESEARCH AND PUBLICATION QUALITY THROUGH SCIENCEDIRECT: WEBINAR BY HASANUDDIN UNIVERSITY LIBRARY




Having access to credible and internationally reputable academic databases is crucial for improving the quality of research and publications for lecturers, researchers, and students at Hasanuddin University (UNHAS). Over the two years since UNHAS began subscribing to ScienceDirect (SD), its publication output has seen a significant increase. This was highlighted by Dr. Fierenziana Junus, Head of the UNHAS Library, during her opening remarks at the webinar held on January 15, 2025, attended by more than 400 participants, most of whom were UNHASlecturers and students.

Dr. Johan Jang, Strategic Engagement Manager for Elsevier Southeast Asia, served as the keynote speaker. He demonstrated easy ways to access, search for, and download articles to support research, publications, and teaching activities. SD is a leading global database hosting approximately 2,700 scientific journals, the majority of which are of high quality, indexed as Q1 and Q2 in Scopus. Specifically, 92% of the journals fall within Q1 and Q2 categories, with 76% classified as Q1. Covering 24 disciplines, the database contains 21 million articles, most of which are Q1 and Q2.

There are two ways for UNHAS academic members to access SD. First, it can be accessed directly on the Unhas campus by visiting sciencedirect.com. Second, it can be accessed remotely by logging in through UNHAS's SSO and signing in using an UNHAS domain email.

Dr. Johan also introduced three highly beneficial features: the Compare Journals feature, SD AI (Artificial Intelligence), and the Reading Assistant. The first feature helps academic members identify the most suitable journals for publication. The second feature simplifies the creation of systematic reviews from two or more articles in just minutes. The third feature allows researchers to ask any question, and the system provides answers with references, most likely from Q1 and Q2 journals. However, the second and third features are still in beta testing and have not yet been publicly released.

The library offers **Kubantuki**', a helpdesk service to assist the UNHAS academic community in utilizing library facilities and services, including SD. UNHAS academic members are encouraged to visit the UNHAS Library or the website https://library.unhas.ac.id and follow the Instagram account @unhas library for more information.































### EXPANDING GLOBAL ENGAGEMENT: UNHAS IO'S 2025 PROGRAM REVIEW AND STAFF EXCHANGE PLANS



The International Office (IO) of Hasanuddin University (UNHAS) held the 2025 IO Annual Program Overview and Preparation Meeting on January 21, 2025, from 8:00 AM to 11:00 AM Makassar time at the IO Meeting Room. The session, led by Andi Masyitha Irwan, Ph.D., (Head of the IO), provided a comprehensive review of the IO's planned activities and initiatives for 2025, with all IO staff members participating. The meeting included discussions on key internationalization programs and strategies, with a focus on the upcoming staff exchange program to Japan and Korea.

The second part of the meeting, co-led by Yusran, a Professional Travel Advisor, and Dr. Andi Masyitha Irwan, focused on the logistics and activities of the staff exchange program, which will involve visits to Yokohama City University (YCU) and Kanazawa University (KU) in Japan, as well as Incheon National University (INU) and Korea University (KU) in Seoul, South Korea. Additionally, the meeting highlighted the preparation for the International Academic Consortium for Sustainable Cities (IACSC) annual assembly, which UNHAS will host, emphasizing the importance of strengthening global academic partnerships and sustainability initiatives.



### ADVANCING PUBLIC HEALTH: PROF. SUKRI AND DIAN SIDIK ARSYAD'S CONTRIBUTIONS SHINE IN UTRECHT



Hasanuddin University (UNHAS) celebrated a significant milestone in academic excellence as Dian Sidik Arsyad, a faculty member in the Department of Epidemiology, Faculty of Public Health (FKM), successfully defended his dissertation titled "Cardiovascular Disease Prevention in Indonesia: Epidemiology, Risk Factors, Organization of Care, and Prevention" at Utrecht University on January 14, 2025.

This remarkable event highlighted the growing recognition of UNHAS's academic contributions on the global stage, with Prof. Sukri Palutturi, SKM, M.Kes., MSc.PH, Ph.D., Dean of FKM, serving as an esteemed examiner and opponent. Invited by Promotor Prof. Doevendans, Prof. Sukri's participation underscored his pivotal role in advancing public health research and education, particularly in cardiovascular health.



Dian Sidik Arsyad's dissertation showcased groundbreaking insights into cardiovascular disease prevention in Indonesia, addressing epidemiology, modifiable risk factors, and the readiness of community health systems. His research, spanning five years and four months, produced eight Scopus-indexed publications, including studies in BMC Public Health, Frontiers in Nutrition, and Nutrients, cementing his reputation as a leading academic in the field.

During the defense, Dian impressed the panel with his mastery of the subject and his ability to translate findings into practical implications. Prof. Sukri commended his work, stating, "Dian's research bridges critical gaps in public health policy and practice, particularly in the fight against cardiovascular diseases in Indonesia." He challenged Dian to further explore the broader impacts of his findings on national health strategies, particularly at community health centers and hospitals.

The examination panel, which included distinguished professors from Utrecht University, praised Dian's dedication and the mentorship provided by Prof. Sukri. A fellow examiner noted, "Prof. Sukri's contributions are invaluable, bridging research and actionable strategies to address pressing health challenges."

The event was graced by the presence of Mariska Dwianti Dhanutirto, Deputy Chief of Mission at the Indonesian Embassy in the Netherlands, further underlining the significance of this academic achievement for Indonesia.

The defense concluded with a laudation from the Co-Promotor, celebrating Dian's academic journey and his commitment to improving public health. A post-defense reception provided an opportunity for dignitaries, faculty, and attendees to engage in meaningful discussions, fostering international collaboration.

This event also spotlighted Prof. Sukri's unwavering dedication to global academic engagement. His leadership has propelled FKM UNHAS to the forefront of public health education and research, inspiring future health professionals to embrace international collaboration in tackling global health challenges.





## HASANUDDIN UNIVERSITY'S FACULTY OF DENTISTRY VISITS MALAYSIAN UNIVERSITIES TO ENHANCE LABORATORY MANAGEMENT SYSTEMS



The Faculty of Dentistry at Hasanuddin University (FKG UNHAS) conducted a visit to three prominent Malaysian universities; Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia, MAHSA University, and University Malaya—from January 22 to 23, 2025. The visit aimed to study Laboratory Information Management Systems (LIMS) focusing on resource planning, material storage, student flow, and centralized management of supplies and equipment repair. This initiative sought to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of laboratory operations at FKG UNHAS.

#### A Memorable Experience in a New Culture



Academic Journey from Madagascar to Indonesia: Experiences, Challenges, and Future Aspirations with the KNB Scholarship

My name is Ralaivao Hanginiaina Emynorane, a 34-year-old Doctoral. student from Madagascar. I am currently pursuing my doctoral studies at the Faculty of Political and Social Sciences (FISIP), Department of Public Administration, Hasanuddin University (UNHAS). In addition to my studies, I work as a lecturer at the State University of Toliara in Madagascar.

Before embarking on my Doctoral journey in Indonesia, I had the opportunity to study Bahasa Indonesia through the Darmasiswa program in 2011-2012 at the State University of Malang, East Java. Following this, I pursued my master's degree in educational management at the same university during the academic year of 2012-2013. My academic journey continued in 2021 when I returned to Indonesia to complete my second master's degree in business administration at the University of Diponegoro in Semarang.

My motivation to study in Indonesia stemmed from a desire to explore new cultures and build meaningful friendships. In 2011, a friend who had studied in Indonesia shared his experiences with me, describing the welcoming nature of the Indonesian community. His positive experiences piqued my interest and strengthened my resolve to pursue my studies in Indonesia. When the opportunity to apply for the Kemitraan Negara Berkembang (KNB) or Developing Countries Partnership Scholarship arose, I was eager to seize it. The prospect of studying under a fully funded scholarship had always been a dream of mine, and I viewed it as an opportunity to challenge my competencies in a highly competitive environment. Receiving the scholarship was a moment of immense pride, as it affirmed my capabilities amidst numerous applicants.

However, it has since become more rigorous, requiring applicants to be well-prepared with technical and language skills. The current process necessitates access to a computer and a mobile phone for the test, and proficiency in either English or Bahasa Indonesia for the interview. One of the significant challenges faced by African applicants, particularly those applying for undergraduate programs, is limited access to technology and the internet. For many, using a computer for the first time during the selection process poses a considerable challenge and may impact their chances of securing the scholarship.



My research focuses on improving the placement services of educational staff by the Department of Education, with a case study on the Department of Education in the Province of Toliara, Madagascar. Throughout my academic journey in Indonesia, I have found the coursework to be well-structured, and the lecturers to be incredibly supportive, always responsive to student inquiries. The research environment in Indonesia is particularly conducive, with universities providing formal research permits , which facilitate smooth collaboration with companies and institutions. As an international student, I have felt welcomed and supported by these institutions.

Adapting to the cultural and academic environment in Indonesia has been a seamless experience for me. The Indonesian community is known for its hospitality, and I have always found my peers to be respectful and helpful. Both the university and the local community have played a pivotal role in ensuring my well-being and academic success. The university offers valuable resources such as academic orientations, while the local community has provided me with opportunities to build connections and engage beyond academic pursuits.

Receiving the KNB Scholarship has provided me with significant benefits, both academically and personally. Financially, it has alleviated my burdens, allowing me to focus entirely on my studies. Academically, it has granted me access to a wealth of resources, participation in conferences, and research opportunities that have enriched my learning experience. 
